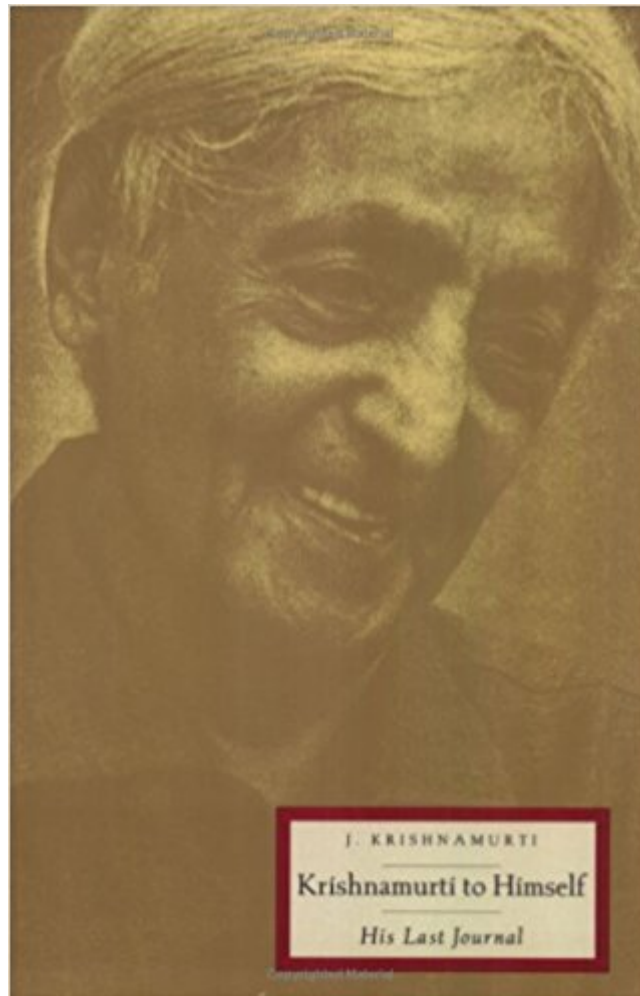




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# Krishnamurti To Himself: His Last Journal

J. Krishnamurti (1895-1986) was a renowned spiritual teacher whose lectures and writings have inspired thousands. His works include *On Mind and Thought*, *On Nature and the Environment*, *On Relationship*, *On Living and Dying*, *On Love and Loneliness*, *On Fear*, and *On Freedom*.

People don't like to think too much about serious matters like death. Krishnamurti spent his whole life thinking about such matters. And I am convinced he experienced some extraordinary states of mind because of it. I don't agree with him about everything. I've spent decades studying meditation, Buddhism, theoretical physics, the brain, and everything else I could to try to understand the world and our relationship to it. Now I know how to ask much better questions than I used to. And Krishnamurti has been a big help in this regard. He knew he was approaching death when he started dictating this into a cassette recorder. If you have never read Krishnamurti, this isn't a bad place to start.

Krishnamurti spoke to audiences all around the world. Although most of what he has spoken about has been written down and published into many books, this book has a significance because he was gone from us not too long after. Spoken into a recording device, at his retreat home in Ojai, California, he shares reflections on all things timeless...meaningful in its simple approach. It is one of those books that you will want to carry around with you to read from in quiet moments, highly recommended.
