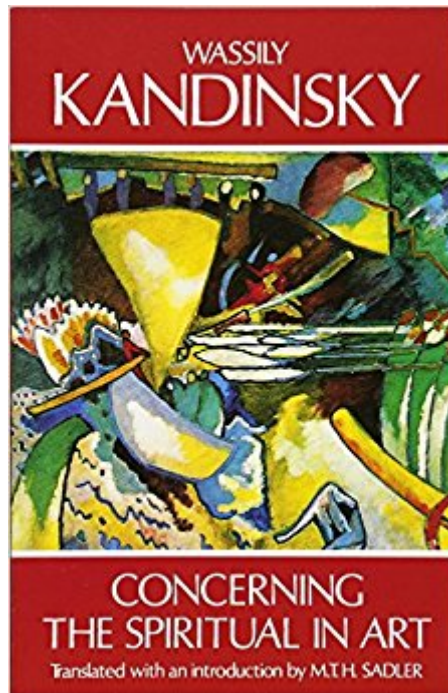




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Concerning The Spiritual In Art

I was rather disappointed with this text for all the superlatives that I had seen about it. It is a manifesto and call to arms for the modern movement which is all good but he bases a large amount of his thesis on (now?) questionable science and philosophical constructs. What it does give is an insight into what he and others in his time were thinking. I have not read the original text, but the translation is laborious. Also missing, are illustrations referenced in the text. And what were the advertisements for Hootsuite doing in the front of the book? In summation, it has been said that all students of art must read this text. I would replace "must" with "may well want to" and add that they should look for a better translation.

I came at this after reading a Georgia O'Keeffe biography where it mentioned that this was one of her major influences. I wish I had read this years ago. It has been one of the best insights into modern art, its transcendence to the spiritual and its relationship to music and the philosophy of the

times. It has left me thinking about my own work and why I do what I do. I don't agree with every point, but it is definitely on my list of must reads for students of art and art lovers. I am sure I will read this a few times!
