


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Bringing Up Girls: Practical Advice And Encouragement For Those Shaping The Next Generation Of Women

Although there were some references to religious beliefs held by the author it was still useful in

opening up my mind again to understanding many different influences that impact a child that goes on beyond to adulthood. This will be helpful in my never ending relationship with my now soon to be 11yrd old daughter.

Not my favorite read as a stay at home mom of two young girls. I feel that JD gives long-winded explanations in a very pedantic and at times condescending tone. It definitely wasn't the "encouraging" read that I was looking for after long days. There are a few golden nuggets I would take away from it but I felt that I spent more time skimming then digesting because it didn't engage me as a reader.

This is such a valuable book I'm not sure how to emphasize it enough. Not only does it go into all of the important things to consider when raising a girl, as the title suggests, but also -it helps you to take a step back and to survey the role of women over recent history, how lies from various sources are hurting the hearts of our young women today- and how to protect your own daughter or any young woman you care for. Also very important is the information about a recent government study, that has gone by quietly, showing the vast difference in the stability, health, intelligence, and social skills between kids raised by a stay-at-home mom vs. kids put through the daycare system: the ones raised by mom at home fared so much better I'm surprised this is not big news in the media. Also vastly important are the studies, thoughts and stories of the hugely important role good fathers play in their daughter's lives. After reading this book I had to go give my husband a big, tearful hug...reading about the things prevented in a woman's future simply from a father who loves and protects his daughter. If you have any young woman in your life: a daughter, granddaughter, niece, student, etc., that you care for and want a good life for, this should be the next book you read.
