


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Alex And Me

This book has been out for a while, but I just read it this spring. I had a vague familiarity with the story of the famous parrot Alex, that he could answer questions about what an item was and what

color it was. I was astounded to read the details - Alex did things that no animal, let alone a bird - could do. Bird's brain structure differs from ours, no neocortex, no Broca's area, which are important for human cognition and speech. Everybody said parrots wouldn't be capable of such higher functions. Alex and Dr. Pepperberg proved them wrong. So many things came together. Dr. Pepperberg had a Ph.D in chemistry. And not just from any school - from MIT and Harvard! She must have had grit, determination and persistence to get through this demanding program back in a time when women were discouraged from studying these fields. She needed all those qualities to get the Alex Studies up and going. Always scrounging for lab space, teaching positions, and funding for assistants, moving from university to university to take advantage of opportunities.... There was considerable pushback from other scientists who were convinced that parrots could not do what Alex did, so therefore it must be a trick. Dr. Pepperberg's story is every bit as amazing as Alex's. She did continue the work, despite the struggles for recognition and funding, until Alex blew our beliefs about avian cognition out of the water. This book describes the research so that it's easy to understand. It goes beyond that to illuminate the special bond between scientist and parrot. It conveys a sense of the difficulty of the long struggle, though Dr. Pepperberg minimizes some of these issues in order to give credit to Alex, who she called her colleague. If she hadn't been so doggedly persistent....if she hadn't designed the experiments so brilliantly to elicit the data needed....if she hadn't worked so tirelessly to build the disciplined training regimen she developed....and if Alex hadn't been so exceptional, then maybe none of the amazing results would have happened. The book describes the story brilliantly, making you feel as if you knew them both. And - spoiler alert for people who never heard of Alex - when Alex died, you might cry like a baby, as I did. She portrays his personality so vividly that his departure leaves a great void. Buy this book, read this book, then go follow the Alex Foundation as they continue the groundbreaking work with Griffin and Athena - African grey parrots like Alex, and learning to repeat his achievements. The fascinating story continues!
